

CONGRESSIONAL CANDIDATE QUESTIONNAIRE

A Model Questionnaire for use by State and Local Lodges

The following model questionnaire is being provided to all State and Local Lodges to aid them in evaluating candidates for Congress. The questions are drawn from issues being lobbied by the Grand Lodge on Capitol Hill.

It is particularly important for the State and Local Lodges to endorse candidates who support our top priority items and oppose those candidates who do not. The success of the National Legislative Program depends on having an active grassroots base and on electing lawmakers who support our pro-law enforcement agenda. The following is a brief summation of the top legislative priorities of the Fraternal Order of Police:

- ***Social Security issues: Support H.R. 1205/S. 915, the “Social Security Fairness Act” and Oppose Mandatory Participation in Social Security***
The FOP strongly supports the repeal of both the “Windfall Elimination Provision” (WEP) and the “Government Pension Offset” (GPO). The FOP vehemently opposes legislation which would mandate participation in Social Security for public employees or new hires who are currently outside the Social Security system.
- ***Support H.R. 964/S.424, the “Law Enforcement Officers’ Equity Act”***
The FOP strongly supports legislation expanding the definition of “law enforcement officer” for salary and retirement benefits to include all Federal law enforcement officers.
- ***Support H.R. 4846/S. 2845, the “Public Safety Employer-Employee Cooperation Act”***
The FOP strongly supports legislation which would guarantee the right of public employees to bargain collectively with their employers over hours, wages, and conditions of employment. The goal of this legislation is to have each State pass a law providing minimum collective bargaining rights to their public safety employees and outlines certain provisions to be included in those laws. Strikes and lockouts would be prohibited and States with collective bargaining laws already on the books will be exempt from any Federal statute.
- ***Support the “State and Local Law Enforcement Discipline, Accountability and Due Process Act”***
The FOP strongly supports a “bill of rights” for law enforcement officers who are, in a number of jurisdictions, denied their due process rights by police administrators and management in noncriminal proceedings. There is a need for a minimum level of procedural protections for law enforcement officers accused of administrative wrongdoing because of the gravity of potential harm to officers created by this lack of uniform safeguards.

Section One:

Employees' Rights and Labor Issues

1. The Fraternal Order of Police strongly supports ***H.R. 1205/S. 915, the “Social Security Fairness Act,”*** which would repeal both the “Windfall Elimination Provision” (WEP) and the “Government Pension Offset” (GPO) in current law. The WEP penalizes certain public employees who also worked in the private sector and paid into the Social Security system, through a substantial reduction in their benefits, because they also collect a government pension. The GPO provision in current law causes the reduction or elimination of the spouse's survivors benefit from Social Security by two-thirds of the monthly amount received from the government pension. If currently a Member of Congress, are you a cosponsor of this legislation? If not, will you pledge to support this legislation in the 116th Congress?
2. In 2001, the Commission to Strengthen Social Security (CSSS) issued a report which rejected a scheme to mandate participation in Social Security for newly hired State and local government employees currently outside the Social Security system. Will you pledge to oppose any legislation which includes a provision mandating participation in the Social Security system for either current or newly hired State and local government employees that do not currently participate in Social Security?
3. In the past few years, politicians at the Federal, State and local level have demonized public sector unions—including unions representing law enforcement officers. Law enforcement officers, who put themselves in harm’s way to protect their neighborhoods and communities, are being held up as objects of scorn and ridicule by these politicians who cite the cost of their hard-earned pensions and benefits as the reason for the government’s fiscal woes. What have you done or what will you do to halt these politically motivated attacks on public safety unions and how will you stand up for these organizations?
4. The Fraternal Order of Police strongly supports ***H.R. 4846/S. 2845, the “Public Safety Employer-Employee Cooperation Act,”*** legislation which recognizes collective bargaining rights for public safety employees (i.e., law enforcement officers and firefighters). What is your position on collective bargaining for public safety employees? Would you also support legislation to allow uniform and non-uniform Federal law enforcement officers to unionize and engage in collective bargaining?
5. If you were a Member of the U.S. House of Representatives in the 111th Congress, how did you vote on 1 July 2010 on the second amendment considered under H. Res. 1500 (*Roll Call Vote #430*)?
6. If you were a Member of the U.S. House of Representatives in the 110th Congress, how did you vote on 17 July 2007 to pass H.R. 980 (*Roll Call Vote #633*)?
7. If you were a Member of the Senate in the 107th Congress, how did you vote on 6 November 2001 invoking cloture to end debate on S. Amdt. 2044 (*Recorded Vote #323*)?

8. The Fraternal Order of Police strongly supports legislation which would articulate the rights of law enforcement officers who are, in a number of jurisdictions, denied their due process rights by police administrators and management. Would you support legislation which would protect the due process rights of law enforcement officers in non-criminal, administrative proceedings?
9. The Fraternal Order of Police strongly supports ***H.R. 964/S. 424, the “Law Enforcement Officers Equity Act,”*** which would expand the definition of “law enforcement officer” under the Civil Service Retirement System and the Federal Employees Retirement System to include all Federal police officers. What is your position regarding the current disparity in the pay and benefits provided to law enforcement officers across the Federal government, and what measures will you support to ensure parity among the Federal government’s public safety officers? If currently a Member of the House, are you a cosponsor of this legislation? If not, will you pledge to support this legislation in the 116th Congress?
10. The FOP is strongly opposed to legislation reducing pay and benefits for our Federal law enforcement officers who put their lives on the line every day. Will you pledge to vote against budgets and legislation that would cut or otherwise erode the retirement and pension benefits of our nation’s Federal law enforcement officers if elected to serve in the 116th Congress?
11. The Patient Protection and Affordable Care Act includes an excise tax on high cost employer-sponsored health coverage. Even though this tax is levied against the insurance provider and the tax does not go into effect until January 2020, the provision is strongly opposed by the Fraternal Order of Police because it could result in a decrease in the quality or increase the cost of plans for law enforcement officers. The provision imposes a forty percent (40%) tax to premiums above \$27,500 for family plans and \$10,200 for individuals. (For example, an individual plan worth \$11,200 would pay a \$400 tax.) There is an increased threshold for employees engaged in high risk professions, which includes law enforcement, of \$3,000 for family plans and \$1,350 for individual plans. Essentially any plan for a law enforcement officer that is under \$30,500 (for a family) or \$11,550 (for an individual) would be exempt from the tax. Also, the thresholds are indexed to increase at the rate of inflation. If currently a Member of Congress, are you a cosponsor of ***H.R. 173/S. 58, the “Middle Class Health Benefits Tax Repeal Act?”*** If you were a Member of the Senate in the 114th Congress, how did you vote on ***S. Amdt 2882 (Recorded Vote #316)***? If not, will you pledge to support this legislation in the 116th Congress?
12. The Fraternal Order of Police strongly supports the use of Defined Benefit (DB) pension plans for public employees and is concerned that these plans are under fire at the State and local level in favor of Defined Contribution (DC) plans, which do not have guaranteed benefits for retirees. Many State lawmakers have proposed legislation which would replace existing Defined Benefit plans with Defined Contribution plans, thereby reducing retirement benefits for employees. What is your position in respect to Defined Benefit and Defined Contribution plans and how might Congress address this issue at the Federal level?

13. The FOP supports efforts to make health care more affordable for our members. If currently a Member of Congress, are you a cosponsor of ***H.R. 35, the “Health Savings Act?”***
14. As a labor organization, the FOP is a strong proponent of collective bargaining. As a labor organization representing public employees, we feel very strongly that the Federal government should not prohibit or obstruct the collective bargaining process at the local or State level. For this reason, we oppose legislation like ***H.R. 785, the “Right to Work Act.”*** If currently a Member of the House, are you a cosponsor of this legislation? If not, will you pledge to oppose this legislation in the 116th Congress?
15. The FOP strongly supports those families whose loved one died in the line of duty. The FOP helped craft ***S. 419, the “Public Safety Officers’ Benefits (PSOB) Improvements Act,”*** which has been signed into law. If currently a Member of the Senate, were you a cosponsor of this legislation and, if elected to the 116th Congress, will you pledge to work with the FOP to support this program and increase its transparency and accountability to survivor families?
16. For several Congresses, the FOP has advocated for legislation that would make Pell Grants more accessible to children of public safety officers who were killed in the line of duty by reducing the expected family contribution to zero. The FOP supports ***H.R. 949/S.597, the “Children of Fallen Heroes Act.”*** The bill has passed Congress and was signed into law. If currently a Member of Congress, were you a cosponsor of this legislation?
17. Last year, the FOP worked closely with Congressional staff to draft and develop legislation that would collect data throughout the Federal government on existing programs to support mental health and wellness for veterans, law enforcement and other Federal employees. The result of this effort was ***H.R. 2228/S. 867, the “Law Enforcement Officers’ Health and Wellness Act,”*** and it is our hope that once this information is compiled, it can be used to create best practices and model guidelines for use by State and local law enforcement agencies. The bill is now law. If a Member of Congress, are you a cosponsor of this legislation? If elected to the 116th Congress, how will you work with the FOP on mental health and wellness issues facing today’s law enforcement officers?
18. Since the Fraternal Order of Police is the largest labor organization representing this country’s law enforcement professionals, how will you involve and consult with our leadership concerning any legislation, hearings, or other Congressional activity relating to labor issues?

Section Two: Criminal Justice Issues

1. Law enforcement is facing a high level of hostility from the communities we protect and serve. Hateful rhetoric and those calling for violence are having an impact—ambush attacks on law enforcement and police shootings have spiked tremendously in the past few years. Fringe organizations have been given a platform by the media to convey the message that police officers are a “militarized” enemy and it is time to attack that enemy. Social media accounts are full of hatred and calls to target and kill police officers. The vitriol, the hateful screeds and statements of those we are sworn to protect and defend, as well as public calls to kill and injure police officers, are horrifying. There is a very real and very deliberate campaign to terrorize our nation’s law enforcement officers and no one has come to our defense. As a Member of the 116th Congress, how will you demonstrate support and commitment to our nation’s law enforcement officers?
2. In response to the increased number of ambush attacks on law enforcement officers, the FOP worked with allies in Congress to introduce ***H.R. 5698/S. 2794, the “Protect and Serve Act.”*** The bill provides for criminal Federal penalties for those who target law enforcement officers and inflict serious bodily harm or death. If you are a Member of the 115th Congress, how did you vote on 16 May 2018 on ***H.R. 5698 (Roll Call Vote #188)***? If elected to the 116th Congress, will you pledge to support such legislation and work with the FOP to get it enacted?
3. The FOP supports ***H.R. 2437/S. 1134, the “Back the Blue Act,”*** which would increase the penalties for threats and violence against law enforcement officers, judges, and courtroom personnel—including making the murder or attempted murder of a law enforcement officer employed by an agency that receives Federal funds a capital offense. The legislation would also impose time and other substantive limits on Federal courts’ review of *habeas corpus* petitions challenging a State court conviction for killing a law enforcement officer, judge, or other public safety officer and incorporate an existing provision of the Federal *habeas* statute that is used to determine whether a defendant may file a successive petition or seek a new evidentiary hearing in Federal court. If currently a Member of Congress, are you a cosponsor of this bill? If elected to the 116th Congress, will you pledge to support such legislation and work with the FOP to get it enacted?
4. The Fraternal Order of Police supports legislation that would limit the amount of damages a criminal defendant could recover as a result of injuries that the criminal incurred in the course of committing or being apprehended for a felony or a crime of violence. If elected, will you support such legislation and work with the FOP to get it enacted in the 116th Congress?
5. For what crimes do you believe that the death penalty is appropriate?
6. The FOP was the primary advocate for the ***Law Enforcement Officers’ Safety Act (LEOSA)*** in 2004 as well as amendments to the statute enacted in 2010 and 2013. The law exempts qualified active and retired law enforcement officers who are properly trained and credentialed from State or local laws prohibiting the carriage of concealed firearms. The FOP is working to expand this exemption to include magazine capacity, the

Guns Free School Zones Act, and access to certain Federal buildings like post offices. The FOP supports *H.R. 2513, the “Police Officers Protecting Children Act,” and H.R. 2561, the “Protecting Police Officers of the Law in Civilian Establishments (POLICE) Act.”* The House Committee on the Judiciary has favorably reported *H.R. 2561*. If currently a Member of the House, are you a cosponsor of these bills and will you pledge to vote in favor of *H.R. 2561* on the House floor? If elected to the 116th Congress, will you pledge to support these efforts?

7. Federal correctional officers, who often have direct and sustained contact with violent inmates in the performance of their duties, are eligible to carry firearms under the provisions of LEOSA. However, they cannot bring their personal weapons into their facilities because they do not have access to secure storage for these weapons. For this reason, the FOP supports *H.R. 613/S. 1084, the “Lieutenant Osvaldo Albarati Correctional Officer Self-Protection Act,”* which would require the Bureau of Prisons within the U.S. Department of Justice to make secure storage available to their employees. The House bill has passed and is currently pending in the Senate. If currently a Member of Congress, are you a cosponsor of this bill? If a Member of the Senate, will you pledge to support this legislation on the floor if it comes to a vote? If elected to the 116th Congress, will you pledge to support similar legislation?
8. The Fraternal Order of Police supports *S. 573/H.R. 1886, the “National Criminal Justice Commission Act,”* which would create a national commission to examine our nation’s criminal justice systems and to make recommendations to Congress based on their findings. A similar commission established in 1965 resulted in a huge step forward for the profession of law enforcement and the criminal justice system at every level of government. We believe that the integrity and credibility of such a commission depends on it being created by an act of Congress. If currently a Member of Congress, are you a cosponsor of this bill? If elected to the 116th Congress, will you pledge to support these efforts?
9. The FOP has long been concerned about foreign governments providing shelter for criminals who commit murder or other serious violent crimes in this country, and subsequently flee to another. The FOP strongly opposes normalization of relations with Cuba until this issue is resolved, but travel restrictions that were in place for decades have recently been relaxed. We have been equally critical of other governments, including France, Israel, and Mexico, on this same point. At the FOP’s Biennial National Conference in 2007, our membership adopted a resolution urging the President of the United States and Congress to take any and all measures necessary to enforce the 1978 Extradition Treaty made between the United Mexican States and the United States of America, “including, but not limited to the cancellation or renegotiation of the Extradition Treaty” and imposition of sanctions “including but not limited to rescinding all financial aid and support to that Government and any and all benefits afforded to that Government under the North American Free Trade Agreement” to ensure that those who commit crimes of violence in the United States are extradited and prosecuted under the laws of the United States. What steps will you take as a Member of Congress:

(A) to place pressure on Cuba, Mexico and other foreign governments that provide safe harbor for those who commit crimes of violence in the U.S. and will you pledge

to make sure that Congress provides vigorous oversight on the issue of extradition of existing and future fugitives when considering agreements with foreign governments?

(B) to deter or condemn efforts by local, State, Federal or foreign governments to honor those who kill or urge the killing of our nation's police officers and what actions will you take to curb politically-motivated attacks on law enforcement officers and reinforce the public confidence in police?

10. "Racial profiling," is once again a political buzzword and media favorite. The FOP has repeatedly condemned the practice and asserted that it is not the policy of any U.S. law enforcement agency to base enforcement decisions solely on race. However, legislation like ***H.R. 1498/S. 748, the "End Racial Profiling Act,"*** continues to be introduced in Congress. How do you define "racial profiling"? Do you believe that Federal legislation is necessary to address this issue and, if so, what would the legislation do and how would it affect law enforcement activity at the State and local level? If you are currently a Member of Congress, are you a cosponsor of this legislation? Will you pledge to oppose bills like this if elected to the 116th Congress?
11. True immigration reform requires action by the Federal government. The FOP believes that any legislation reforming our nation's immigration system must provide for greater security at our nation's borders, aggressive enforcement of immigration law internally, and enhanced penalties against businesses and individuals that exploit and traffic in illegal laborers. Do you agree? What elements do you see as most important for a comprehensive immigration reform bill?
12. There are advocates in Congress and the current Administration which seek to address the real problem of "sanctuary cities" by proposing that these jurisdictions lose access to vital Federal funds supporting State and local law enforcement. The FOP has repeatedly voiced our opposition to such proposals—if "sanctuary cities" are less safe than other jurisdictions, it is at variance with common sense and good policy to withhold monies to support public safety. We therefore opposed Section 2 of ***H.R. 3003, the "No Sanctuary for Criminals Act."*** If currently a Member of Congress, do you support such proposals? If currently a Member of the House, are you a cosponsor of ***H.R. 3003*** and how did you vote on *Roll Call Vote #342*?
13. Federal funding for State and local law enforcement is a very real concern, especially given the increased homeland security responsibilities of State and local agencies and the impact of deep cuts to our most critical programs in the past two years. How will you work to ensure continued Federal funding for traditional law enforcement programs like the hiring program administered by the Office of Community Oriented Policing Services (COPS), the Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (Byrne-JAG) programs, the State Criminal Alien Assistance Program (SCAAP), and the Bulletproof Vest Partnership (BVP) program? If a Member of the Senate, are you a cosponsor of ***S. 318, the "COPS Improvements Act,"*** or ***S. 2774, the "COPS Reauthorization Act,"*** and, if elected to the 116th Congress, will you pledge to support similar legislation?
14. The FOP is seeing a growing trend on the part of Congress to write legislation withholding Federal assistance to State, local and tribal law enforcement agencies unless

they comply with certain policy conditions. These tactics are used by both parties and the issues range from sanctuary cities to data collection. The vast majority of our nation's law enforcement officers serve *local* governments and these decisions should be made at the local level. As a Member of the 116th Congress, will you pledge to oppose this type of legislative coercion and work with the FOP to develop ways to provide incentives instead of penalties to achieve Federal policy goals?

15. The FOP has long supported programs like the 1033 program, which is a surplus equipment program administered by the Defense Logistics Agencies (DLA) and the Law Enforcement Support Office (LESO) at the U.S. Department of Defense (DoD). The current Administration recently fully restored the integrity of this program as well as those administered by the U.S. Departments of Homeland Security and Justice. Even with these programs restored, the FOP believes Congressional action is necessary to avoid the politicization of life-saving equipment used by law enforcement officers. For this reason, the FOP supports ***H.R. 426/S. 1087, the "Lifesaving Gear for Police Act."*** If you are currently a Member of Congress, are you a cosponsor of this legislation? Will you pledge to support such legislation if elected to the 116th Congress?
16. As a result of an increased awareness of the potential for DNA analysis evidence to help solve criminal cases, the demand for DNA testing continues to grow nationwide. Crime laboratories now process more DNA than ever before but their expanded capacity cannot meet the increased demand. In August of 2015, according to the Federal government's best estimates, there are at least 350,000 DNA samples from murder and rape cases that remain untested. The Fraternal Order of Police supports legislation such as ***S. 139/H.R. 510, the "Rapid DNA Act,"*** which has been signed into law. If a Member of the current Congress, were you a cosponsor of this legislation?
17. The House recently passed ***H.R. 387, the "Email Privacy Act,"*** without the support of any major law enforcement group. In addition, there are several efforts to include the text of this bill as a provision in larger legislative vehicles. Law enforcement, subject to appropriate judicial oversight and approval, must maintain its ability to access and recover digital evidence. We believe that the Electronic Communications Privacy Act needs to be updated to ensure that existing statutes and procedures:
 - allows for exceptions to the search warrant requirement in cases where there is an imminent threat of physical harm, likely destruction of evidence, consent by a victim or a witness, or public safety emergencies that are not necessarily part of a criminal investigation (missing child, missing elderly adult);
 - takes into account for types of data that are increasingly a part of criminal and terrorism investigations such as publicly posted electronic content (e.g. social media postings by criminal organizations or online advertisements by child sex traffickers);
 - allows for an exception to the warrant requirement for basic information such as the email address located on the To/From lines of an email, which is comparable to the address information externally displayed on an envelope containing a physical letter; and
 - addresses the lack of standards for service provider response to lawful orders, which delays the investigative process to the detriment of public safety.

Would you agree with these key law enforcement needs and, if elected, will you pledge to work with the FOP to address these issues?

18. Several organizations and many fringe groups have accused State and local law enforcement agencies receiving Federal assistance through the 287(g) program of using these funds to “target communities of color, including disproportionate numbers of Latinos in particular places, for arrest.” The FOP rejects these assertions as hateful and counter to the law enforcement mission. The 287(g) program is a powerful example of a successful cooperative effort between State and local law enforcement and the Federal government. For State and local agencies, the Federal resources provided by the program allow them to pursue investigations relating to violent crimes, human trafficking, gang/organized crime activity, sexual-related offenses, narcotics trafficking and money laundering. It also allows the Federal government to tap into the resources and capabilities of State and local agencies to identify and remove serious and violent criminals who have illegally entered the United States. As a Member of Congress, would you support this program?
19. Firearms policies and legislation has becoming increasingly politicized. What are your views on existing firearms law and what measures would you consider as a Member of Congress?
20. With deliberate, targeted attacks on law enforcement officers increasing significantly, the FOP supports making such attacks on a State or local law enforcement officer an aggravating offense in capital cases prosecuted at the Federal level. For this reason, the FOP supports *H.R. 115/S. 1085, the “Thin Blue Line Act.”* If currently a Member of the House Committee on the Judiciary, how did you vote when the bill was considered? If a Member of the House, what was your vote on *Roll Call Vote #265*?
21. The FOP provided critical support the passage of the Comprehensive Addition and Recovery Act (CARA) to address the heroin/opioid epidemic. While our members fight this growing problem in our communities, the FOP has been working with our allies in Congress to further address this issue, as well as that of fentanyl and other synthetic and analogue drugs, by supporting the following bills:
 - *H.R. 664/S. 372, the “Stem the Tide of Overdose Prevalence from Opiate Drugs (STOP OD) Act”;*
 - *H.R. 1057/S. 372, the Synthetic Trafficking and Overdose Prevention (STOP) Act”;*
 - *H.R. 1732, the “Synthetic Drug Control Act,”;*
 - *H.R. 2142/S. 708, the “International Narcotics Trafficking Emergency Response by Detecting Incoming Contraband with Technology (INTERDICT) Act,”*
 - *H.R. 2851/S. 1327, the “Stop the Importation and Trafficking of Synthetic Analogues (SISTA) Act,”*
 - *S. 207, the “Synthetic Abuse and Labeling of Toxic Substances Act,” and*
 - *S. 2789, the “Substance Abuse Prevention Act.”*

If currently a Member of Congress, are you a cosponsor of any of these bills? If elected to the 116th Congress, how will you work with the FOP to combat the unlawful use of opioids and synthetic drugs?

22. Congress has been talking about comprehensive sentencing reform for several years but has not managed to craft legislation that was able to garner any support from law enforcement. With violent crimes once again on the rise and a drug epidemic that is killing tens of thousands of Americans each year, do you believe it is appropriate to lower current Federal sentences for some crimes? Do you support retroactive application of such reductions which will lead to the early release of those convicted of offenses under current law or would you support prospective application of “good time” credits or program participation to accelerate the release of certain incarcerated offenders? If you were a Member of the House in the 115th Congress, how did you vote on ***H.R. 5682, the “Formerly Incarcerated Reenter Society Transformed Safely Transitioning Every Person (FIRST STEP) Act,”*** (Roll Call Vote #215)? If elected to the 116th Congress, will you work with the FOP on prison reform and related issues?
23. The current Administration has restored the Federal asset forfeiture program, including the equitable sharing programs, and has adopted additional protections for claimants and provided for greater transparency with respect to the process. The FOP strongly supported the actions, but remain concerned that Congress will again try to end the equitable sharing program and Federal asset forfeiture, which we believe will hurt our ability to fight crime. If elected to the 116th Congress, will you pledge to support the current programs on asset forfeiture and fight to maintain its use as a law enforcement tool?
24. For several years, the FOP has been advocating for the collection of beneficial ownership information for all businesses incorporating in the United States in order to protect the U.S. economy and consumers from criminals who exploit our financial system using shell corporations and other financial institutions to conduct or profit from illegal activity. If currently a Member of Congress, are you a cosponsor of ***H.R. 3089/S. 1454, the “Corporation Transparency Act”***? If elected to the 116th Congress, will you pledge to work with the FOP on this issue and others related to our efforts to update and improve our nation’s anti-money laundering system?
25. If you were a Member of the House in the 115th Congress, what was your vote on these floor votes:
- *Roll Call Vote #244, on final passage of H.R. 1180, the “Working Families Flexibility Act”*
 - *Roll Call Vote #266, on final passage of H.R. 1892, the “Honoring Hometown Heroes Act”*
 - *Roll Call Vote #268, on final passage of H.R. 1039, the “Probation Officers’ Protection Act”*
 - *Roll Call Vote #284, final passage of H.R. 1761, the “Protecting Against Child Exploitation Act”*
 - *Roll Call Vote #294, final passage of H.R. 2213, the “Anti-Border Corruption Reauthorization Act”*
